HISTORY

All Officers and Enlisted Men of the 25th Bombardment and 395th Bombardment Squadrons were transferred from the 40th Bombardment Group to the 462nd Bombardment Group (H), Walker Army Air Field, Victoria, Kansas per Special Orders Number 50,this Headquarters dated 24 August 43. (Incl. #1) Also included in the transfer, same authority, was approximately 50% of the Headquarters, 40th Bomb Group (H) Officer and Enlisted personnel. The movement was accomplished by truck convoy on August 27th and 28th.

On August 30th, approximately 50% of the 45th Bombardment Squadron personnel was transferred to the 395th Bombardment Squadron, per paragraph 3 and 4, Assignment Memo Number 65, the Headquarters dated 24 August 43. (Incl. #2) The 44th Bombardment Squadron was split in like manner, per paragraph 1 and 2, same assignment memo, to form the new 25th Bombardment Squadron. Major Walter Y. Lucas assumed command of the new 395th Bombardment Squadron and Major Warren S. Wilkinson assumed command of the new 25th Bombardment Squadron.

Immediately after the "split", Officers and Enlisted personnel began to arrive from the 58th Bombardment Wing (H) aimed toward bringing the 40th Bombardment Group (H) up to authorized strength. The new personnel for the most part are coming from schools where they were specially trained for the B-29 Project. The men are well trained in the theory of the new B-29 plane and it is the job of the Group to give them practical training.

The Group training program is underway and the following is a resume of the activities of the various sections:

<u>Navigation School:</u> Group Navigator conducting DR and celestial school for 35 Bombardiers. Approximately 60% trained. DR air missions accomplished in B-26's and B-17's. Celestial theory already covered but celestial air missions not yet begun. It is estimated this school will be completed within three weeks.

<u>Bombing School:</u> Group Bombardier conducting school for 12 navigators all of who are ready to drop bombs. Approximately 70% trained.

<u>Communications</u>: Curriculum drawn up, code table equipment on hand but no building available at present to house the school.

Gunnery: Central fire control station being organized by two officers in the Group. Lieutenants

Redler and Nichols in charge with eight Enlisted Men to assist as instructors. Program is being delayed at present by lack of turrets. It is estimated that training will start within ten days. It is planned that squadron armament personnel will attend this course of instruction. A curriculum is already drawn up, space is available for classrooms, trainers and mock-ups but details on actual processing of students have not been worked out.

<u>Radar:</u> Group radar officer (Capt Hilt) at present conducting a radar school on IFF (B-29) for all radio operators in the Group. Capt Hilt is organizing a course of instructions on absolute altimeter, bombing through overcast equipment, blind landing equipment for navigators, bombardiers, and pilots. Radio operators will also receive this instruction. Mock-up sets on all equipment.

<u>Intelligence</u>: Group Intelligence Officer through squadron intelligence officers conducting first phase intelligence training in the squadrons at a minimum of two hours weekly. This includes occasional film strips on pertinent subjects.

<u>Physical Training</u>: Each officer and each enlisted man of all squadrons take a minimum of three hours exercise per week under supervision of squadron athletic officers.

<u>Military Courtesy:</u> Conducted by squadrons – not given first priority.

<u>Weather:</u> Group Weather Officer (Capt Carroll) has prepared a course of instruction for all flying personnel. This is to incorporate in the Group training program to be published about October 5th.

General:

- (1) Six link trainers in operation.
- (2) Two CNT trainers in operation.
- (3) Two Jam Handy trainers to be in operation within a few days.
- (4) Group radio station in operation air to ground net.
- (5) Radio range in operation.
- (6) War building being finished off with maps of appropriate world sectors for any briefing.
