1 Oct 1945 to 10 Jan 1946

The first of the Air Echelon to leave Tinian was on the night of the 9th of Oct. 1945, between the hours of 2200 and 2400. It was a movement of four (4) 25th ships that had been designated as stand-bys for the 40th Group. They arrived in the United States at Mather Field, Sacramento, California on the morning of the 11th of October 1945.

The groups were then sent either to Separation Centers or on Temporary Duty, rehabilitation and road counts, for forty-five (45) days; it was later extended until 10 Jan. 1946, ordered to report to March Field, California.

March Field, California is designated as the permanent base of the 40th Bomb Group. The main force of the 25th Squadron Air Echelon left Tinian on the 12th of Oct. and arrived in the United States at Mather Field, California on the 15th of Oct. They were given forty-five (45) days temporary duty, rehabilitation and road counts.

On November 7th, the Ground Echelon departed the tropical Isle of Guam on the "Mayoak boat". Embarked at Willington Inn Anzio, California, on the 25th of November 1945 at 1400. They then proceeded to Camp Anna, Riverside, California. The troops were either separated or remained with the squadron.

The cadre and twelve (12) enlisted men arrived at March Field under the direction of Lts Ingear, Reith, and Boening. Major J. Wilters remained at March Field, and was acting Adjutant of the 40th Group. The main force reported to March Field, on or about the 10th of January 1946, after a very happy Christmas and New Years.

Among the accomplishments for the month of February were the appointments afores mentioned. A school program was initiated for all flying personnel. Badminton teams and softball teams were organized.

The Squadron was handicapped by a shortage of Clerical help. This delayed the functioning of administrative work. At the end of the month however, this problem was overcome.

The mission of the 25th Squadron is one of training. Its intention is to keep a high level of proficiency among all flying personnel. It is hoped that all will gain in the knowledge and execution of their various duties thru the continuance of schooling. This type of schooling is not unlike the training undergone in their OTU days, and much of it may be considered in the nature of general reviews.

Training consisting of both ground school and flying began in the early part of the month.

For the pilots their program consisted of the following subjects: Rx. i on weather, codes, D. R. navigation, air craft instruments, G. auto pilot, and 16 tapes by CAA Flight control men.

For the navigators: D. R. & celestial navigation, codes, weather, magnetic compass, A.T.C. and C.P.C.

For the bombardiers: D.R. navigation, bombing procedures and codes.

For the engineer: A-29 engineering.

For the Radio operators - use, maintenance, radio, & how and procedure.

or the aerial gunners - K-14 mounting procedure & I. C. T.

The flying phase of the program consisted of transition and instrument flying for the pilots. During these flights the navigators, bombardiers, co-pilots and the enlisted flying personnel were included as flight observers.

All the flying took place in -25's and A-11's. The aircraft were temporarily assigned to the squadrons from the 400th Bomb Group.

The 28th Bomb Squadron during February had no aircraft assigned to it. The morale of the officers and men is excellent.

No problems which seems to worry on the many - seem to be housing situations. An attempt to alleviate this has been made for the enlisted personnel. barracks have been sub-divided for the purpose of housing 60 enlisted personnel and their families.

In Fe. 1, the squadron strength stood at 112 officers, and 174 enlisted men. Of the officers, 109 were present for duty, and 3 were on leave. Of the enlisted men, 165 were present for duty, and 11 were on furlough. The total squadron strength was 286 officers and enlisted men.

Of the officers, a total of 46 were attached to other organizations, while all of the enlisted men were assigned to the squadron. On Feb. 23, the squadron had 42 officers assigned and none attached. Nine of the officers were on detached service and one on leave.

Seventeen enlisted men were assigned to the squadron, with 123 present for duty, and thirty-four (34) on detached service. Eight (8) were on furlough.

The officer strength showed a loss of fifty-one (51) officers. During February this loss is attributed to the fact that the officers attached were relieved from assignment either to the 28th Bomb Squadron.

The enlisted strength shows only a loss of three (3) men.
