SQUADRON HISTORY

1 June thru 30 June 1945

On 1 June 1945, there were 140 officers and 562 enlisted men assigned to the Squadron.

Squadron personnel, throughout the month, have been extremely busy. Ten combat missions have n flown to drop bombs on major cities and installation on the Japanese home islands. The general ciency and effort of combat and maintenance personnel is probably best indicated by the following istical information.

- 1. 96% of all planes schedule for combat missions have been airborne.
- 2. Only 3.7% of all aircraft airborne have not bombed enemy targets.
- 3. 92% of all planes airborne have bombed the primary target.
- 4. 14% of the 25th Squadron planes have sustained battle damage through the month. This percentage is almost double the Group record of 7.7% of all planes sustaining battle damage.
- 5. No. Planes were lost during the month.
- 6. An average of eight sorties per plane has been flown by each plane available to the Squadron.
- 7. An average of 5.5 missions per crew has been flown by each crew available to the Squadron for combat duty.
- 8. The 25th Squadron dropped 660.75 tons of bombs on primary targets during the month. This record is higher than the record for either of the other two Squadrons in the Group.
- 9. The 25th Squadron dropped 691 tons of bombs on all enemy targets during the month. This record is higher than the record for either of the other two squadrons in the Group.

Following is the squadron gunnery report supplied by gunnery office Andrew M. LeBlaun Jr., WOJG

Gunnery this month shown an increase in accuracy over last month, due to a different technique in briefing. The missions that were run the first part of the month were briefed as usual. The fifth mission to be run this month was briefed suggesting the gunners to open fire at an attacking aircraft immediately after it pointed its nose at the B-29. This tactic requires a slight increase in the expenditure of ammunition but the results are satisfactory in that no enemy aircraft came closer than 500 yards to the formations. No Squadron aircraft were lost due to enemy air opposition this month. Battle damage was slight. Malfunction of guns and CCF equipment showed a decrease over last month in mechanical failures but increased in personnel errors due to the influx of new crews in the Squadron. The number of trained crews decreased this month due to completion of the allowed number of missions by the CBI crews. The effectiveness of B-29 strikes are expected to decrease the month of July pending improved proficiency of the new crews.

Squadron gunners claimed three Zeke damaged, one Mike, one Tony, one Tojo, one Zeke probably destroyed and one Frank damaged. Confirmation is pending on most of the claims.

Training for replacement crews starting this month on aiming level but new crews are still orienteered by the Squadron gunnery officer.

Gunnery in this Squadron has been very successful this month from every standpoint.

- 10. Crew members, during June, claimed eight enemy planes destroyed, probably destroyed, or damaged.
- 11. The Squadron logged 1607:45 hours of combat flying during the month. This record is an increase from 1273:43 hours of combat flying during May. This record also is higher than the records for either of the other two Squadrons in the Group during the month of June.

The above record indicates that the various sections of the Squadron and individuals assigned to the sections have been doing excellent work maintaining and flying the planes.

Following is a list of combat crew members who have, during the month, completed 35 combat missions. The fact should be realized that many of these men came overseas with the Squadron when it was transferred from Pratt, Kansas to Chakulia, India in April 1944. Many of these men have been amoung the critical pioneer crews who not only faced the hazards entailed in testing under combat conditions a new plane which was the largest bombing plane ever produced, but also they faced the additional hazards of operating in India's hot disease-ridden fetid climate, flying the "Hump," flying from the muddy bases of China, and first meeting and testing Japan's home defenses. Many of these men have participated in events which marked the milestones along mankind's history of warfare if not also history of the progress of the still new science of air travel. These men are heroes. Also, they are the surviving members of many crews composed of men who, though equally brave and equally capable, through the charges and fortunes of war either were injured, killed, or captured.
