Squadron History
October thru January

The month of October brought from the good news that we flew the last leg of our globe circling tour. The feverish activities to prepare for our trip home were similar only to those of our largest bombing missions; all of our aircraft received new engines and last minute test hops... all of our records were checked and the baggage was carefully loaded aboard each aircraft the night before leaving.

On the morning of October 12th, Lt Col Neil E. Temple took off with four other aircraft from Tinian, bound west. The following evening, the remainder of the squadron took off leaving behind only the ground crewmen that later returned by boat.

Our air crewmen arrived safely at Mather Field, California, and to be stateside once more was even more wonderful than we had envisioned. Our warm reception at Mather Field lasted only a few hours, as we were sent to nearby Camp 20 a.m. Here many of us said goodbye to old friends as each man left for his individual Rec. & Dis. Center.

The Squadron had now completed its second tour of overseas duty and those of us returning, have enjoyed an eighty day leave.

On January 10th, 1946, the Squadron reassembled at March Field, Riverside, California. At this time our members were less than the returnees from a Tokyo mission. We had a flightline airplane and maintenance personnel, and those who needed flying time flew B-25's and AT-6's that were on the base and assigned to the 36th Bomb Wing.
