History region of 1 February thru 29 February

General:

The history period, covered by the inclusive dates above, reflects a fultitude of rapid changes in the phases of squadron life and activity. While m st of the history will record the pre-aration and movement of the organization from its training ground at Fratt, Kantas to the theatre of 0 erations, mention will be made of the closing days of training and the preliminary strees or organization at APO #631. The expediency of work and preparation rior to everseas adjument, coupled with unadvoidable errors congruent with any large scale planning, crused morals and unit s irit to fluxuria as much as the variances in personalities. This writing will ettem to record accretely the true statut of the relation throughout the complete period.

1 February to 1' February 1944

Training:

During the period of tile indicated above all efforts in the squedron were directed towards completing all assigned training before the union to Oversees Movement ins action scheduled for February 19th.

All personnel, not already qualified in their authorized arms, were sent to the renge until qualification was obtained. Kansas at the tile was having some of its coldest weather and difficulty was experienced in handling cold steel to the degree or proficiency demanded by regulations.

Class a in ground school were dispensed with, except for make-up's in sero-medical and Intelligence lectures. Operations concentrated on scheduling svailable B-17's in long-range nevigation and high altitude missions to complete this these of air training. At the same time orew members were concluding work in combat technique.

Personnel:

Clothing ins ections were held asservery effort we made to have all sen in the organization pro only equipped with clothing and individual equipment. Service records, 201 files, clothing records and all related records were checked and brownst as to date. The squadron was administratevely prepared for the approaching move overseas.

On 12 February 1st Lt rAUL E McDEMANT JH, 0-566070, was assigned to the organization as adjutant, vice 1st Lt ROBERT J. MCRESON, 0-564020 retieved. Lt PATERSON was transferred becomes of length of time required to recover from a major overation, and all personnel were sorry to see him left behind. In Lt McDERLOT: we received a capable replacement with a cod background in personnel and administrative work.

18 February to 29 February 1944

General:

Strategy Line

On the 18 February the first overseas B-29, sir, land # 12-6261, we assigned to the squadron. The sirplane was further assigned to the crews of Capt BOYD L GRUSARAH and let It MARVIN a STOCKETT. There was a multitude of work to be accomplished, since the Janu was not modified. All entires had to be charged replaced with the new combat engine, slong with numerous modifications in certain equipment and perce of the simplane. To facilitate speed of work, and at the same time further equality combat crew personnel with the maintenance aspects of the B-29, the two crews were placed on 12 hour shifts to bring the simplane into commission.

During the remainder of February the following additional airplanes were saigned to the 45th Bombardment Squadren, and in turn assigned to the orews indicated:

In each assignment the same provision for accomplishing necessary modifications was made by placing the crews on 12 hour shifts of maintenance, and modification work.

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Training:

All training was considered completed at the end of February. The last mays of February sew most operations senedules listing high altitude bombing missions in B-17's and ferry missions carrying crows to the solification Conters at mariette, Ga and Okiahoma City to bring back B-29's to the troup. Fotal flying time for the Squadron, B-17's and B-29's co-bined, was 506:55.

The com letion of the training was viewed in two different lights by a data are personnel. For the most part the Len were proud of their afforts and hard work. A lot had been accombinated. They could look back and reembor when the first B-29 was exsigned to the Squadron in July 1943. It was the first plane to come off of the production line, and the first to be assigned to a Squadron. All training has been conducted under severe nendiceps. Production "bugs" had to be ironed out and familiarisation and training of srews on the simplane was retorded by the rest that at no the were there were then two b-29's assigned to the Unit cointenance was were confused with the croblem of keeping an emplane flying that was constantly presenting difficulties associated with any lew type of equipment. B-17's had to be substituted to meet the training requirements. Kansas had given a good portion of bed weather in addition. Yet, with all hindrances, a precedent had been established and the new similar was viewed with ride and confidence.

On the other side of the ledger was the idea that the project was incomplete. Some felt that the lack of gunnery, restricted amount of actual flying time, and actual extensive training in the B-29 itself might be a serious problem in combat operations. However, shows had been formed and personnel were organized. Individual pride in ability and confidence in the importance of the assignment to use predominated.

Personnel:

On 21 February 1st Lt CLARENCE P LOWMAN, Squadron Intelligence officer, 1st Lt : AUL E McDERMOTT FR, Equadron Adjutant, and Set Scaborn N. Brook Jr, Intelligence N. C. O. departed from the Squadron and Prett to proceed to the Theater of Operations, via A. T. C. They were part of the Advanced Headquarters, 40th Bombardment Group, which totaled 11 officers and nine EM.
